Centres for Excellence

Norwegian Centres for Excellence in Education - they contribute to an institution's reputation and enhance the quality of T&L

teaching awards

national or institution-based

performance agreements

financial sanctions can be implemented if goals are not achieved

How they are seen by stakeholders

Project / application based funding has downsides

sustainability after project end administrative burden and timelines -> fast reaction (e.g. to crises like Covid19) is not possible through such funding schemes

Balance of autonomy and governance also in L&T

Question of freedom of teaching

lack of additional funding for individual teachers

Other / new / innovative approaches to incentives and sanctions

incentives to encourage teachers

relevance of teaching for careers no consequences for bad teaching

incentives better than sanctions

rather than focusing on sanctions, countries should invest in incentives, e.g. through competitive calls - not getting additional funding is already a "sanction"

cooperation and dissemination

institutions/individuals that are successful in T&L should be incentivised to disseminate their knowledge and to cooperate with others
